
Choosing a Nursing Education Program





Nursing is a rewarding and challenging career with a variety of employment opportunities. As a future nursing student, it is important to choose a nursing program that fits your learning needs and one that will prepare you to achieve your career goals. As you compare different nursing programs, we encourage you ask questions and find the answers before enrolling in any program.

The Virginia Board of Nursing regulates in state pre-licensure nursing education programs. The <u>regulations</u> are available on the <u>Board of Nursing website</u>.



What kind of program are you looking for?

Are you looking for a master's entry registered nursing program, a baccalaureate degree registered nursing program, an associate degree nursing program or a practical nursing program? Make sure the program you choose is the program that will prepare you for your career goals as a registered nurse or a licensed practical nurse.

Is my desired program accredited?



Nursing education programs operating in the Commonwealth of Virginia **must be approved** by the Virginia Board of Nursing. Nursing education programs are required to notify applicants of their current board approval status.

In Virginia, nursing programmatic accreditation is required for RN programs; however, nursing programmatic accreditation is voluntary for LPN programs.



What are the NCLEX pass rates for the program?



The National Council Licensure Exam (NCLEX) is the licensure exam that demonstrates entry into practice competence. Passing the NCLEX is a requirement for licensure in all 50 States and the District of Columbia.

The <u>NCLEX pass rates</u> for the current year and the past 5 years are available on the Board of Nursing website for all nursing programs approved to operate in Virginia. Nursing programs with an NCLEX pass rate of 80% or above meet the Board's requirements for the NCLEX exam. The program's overall pass rate is one indication of overall program success.

What kinds of professional experiences will my education require?



Nursing is a practice profession and your education will require classroom (in person, online, or hybrid), skills lab, and clinical experiences.

Clinical experiences will be an important piece of your education. Ask where clinical experiences will be conducted. Don't forget to consider travel time. Think about the distance you will have to travel to the various sites.

Virginia Board of Nursing Experience Requirements

- At least 400 hours of direct client care clinical experience for practical nursing programs
- At least 500 hours of direct client care experience for RN programs
- Clinical experiences must occur in a variety of acute, non-acute, community-based, and long-term care clinical settings
- Experiences must include adult medical/surgical nursing, geriatric nursing, maternal/infant nursing, mental health nursing, nursing fundamentals, and pediatric nursing





What personal costs should I expect?



Cost may vary depending on the institution you choose. Make sure to research tuition, fees and other expenses before making your selection.

Keep in mind that nursing education will most likely require the purchase of additional equipment, uniforms, and other resources, so be sure to ask!

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Students may inquire about financial aid opportunities through their individual nursing program.

Admitted students looking for financial aid might consider scholarship opportunities to include the <u>Mary Marshall Scholarship_Fund</u>.



Will I be required to take a comprehensive exam?

The Virginia Board of Nursing does not regulate the use of a comprehensive exam.



Make sure to ask about the requirements for taking a comprehensive/high stakes exam, set by the program, to progress in the program or graduate and apply for licensure.

Be sure to understand the policy before investing time and money.

Nursing education programs are required by regulation to disclose the use of comprehensive/high stakes exams to nursing program applicants.





How should I research programs?



Being proactive about your search for a nursing education program is an integral step in the selection process.

When researching to find the right school for you, consider the following aspects of the various programs you're looking at:

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- Know the policies of the nursing program as well as the parent institution. Be sure to read the nursing program handbook as well as the college catalog.
- For example, nursing programs will frequently have a different attendance policy than the parent institution or may have a higher passing standard.
- Determine if the Board of Nursing has taken action on a nursing education program by reviewing <u>Case</u> <u>Decisions/Board Orders Against Education Programs</u>.
- Know the program's current <u>NCLEX pass rates</u>.



Do I qualify for advanced placement?



Many nursing programs offer advanced placement. A program may give you credit for previous courses, clinical experiences you had in your LPN program, or military experience. Ask if these options are available at your school of interest.

Do I qualify for an accelerated program?



If you already have a baccalaureate degree, ask about an accelerated or second degree program. Several nursing education programs in Virginia offer second degree programs, so it might not take as long as you think!
